COLLEGE'S STUDENT POPULATION

Course Success Rates: Fall 2018 through Fall 2022

Sacramento City College students' course success rates from the five most recent Fall terms are shown below. Course success rate is the percentage of course enrollments in which students earned an A, B, C, or pass in their courses. The tables below show course success rates achieved by students disaggregated by different characteristics (i.e., ethnicity, gender, and low income status, and first time student status).

COLLEGE'S VARIOUS STUDENT POPULATIONS

This section provides information about specific student populations at the college that are generally of interest and most commonly researched.

Older Students

Older students, defined as those aged 25 and older, comprise approximately 40% of the Fall 2022 college student population. Their course success rates, course enrollments, and headcounts during the five most recent Fall terms are shown in the tables and graphs below.





Low Income Students

Low income students, defined as those receiving the California Promise Grant or formerly Board of Governor's Waiver, comprise approximately 57% of the Fall 2022 college student population. Their course success rates, course enrollments, and headcounts during the five most recent Fall terms are shown in the tables and graphs below.



Part-time Students

Part time students, defined as those who completed fewer than 12 units, comprise approximately 62% of the Fall 2022 college student population. Their course success rates, course enrollments, and headcounts during the five most recent Fall terms are shown in the tables and graphs below.





First Generation Students

First generation students include those whose parents/ guardians have an education level no higher than high school. This population comprise approximately 29% of the Fall 2022 college student population. Their course success rates, course enrollments, and headcounts during the five most recent Fall terms are shown in the tables and graphs below.



First Time Students

First time students comprise approximately 16% of the Fall 2022 college student population. Their course success rates, course enrollments, and headcounts during the five most recent Fall terms are shown in the tables and graphs below.


Ethnic breakdown of the student population at the college during Fall 2022 are listed in the visual to the left. The four largest groups include Hispanic/Latino (32.61%), White (26.35%), Asian (16.73%), and African American (9.88%).

The majority of students report being low income (62.34%) (i.e., being a recipient of the California Promise Grant, formerly Board of Governor's Waiver)) and also not being first generation (71.12%). (A first generation student means neither parent/ guardian has an education level higher than high school).



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




The majority of students at the college (54.06%) during Fall 2022 are full time (i.e., enroll in more than 12 units) while the remaining population (45.94%) are part time (i.e., enroll in fewer than 12 units).

The majority of students at the college are continuing students (47.217%), while fewer are first time students (21.72%), returning students (14.36%), first time transfer students (13.61%), and special admit students (3.07%).

• Continuing students are those who enrolled at the college during the current term (i.e., Fall 2022) and were also enrolled at the college during the previous regular term (i.e., Spring 2022).




- Returning students are those who enrolled at the college during the current term (i.e., Fall 2022) after an absence of enrollment at the college for one or more primary terms.
- First time transfer students are those who reported that they transferred from a different college.
- Special admit students are those who are currently enrolled in a K-12 but taking courses from the college.




interests, or are undecided on their goals.

The majority of students (59.51%) report having goals to transfer to a four-year university after earning an Associate degree, while fewer report having goals to transfer to a four-year university without earning an Associate degree (11.74%). Students also report having a goal of earning an Associate degree without transferring to a four-year university (15.93%) or earning a certificate (3.18%). The remaining population reporting taking courses at the college for various reasons, including acquiring job skills, updating job skills, completing high school/ GED, discovering career





The most popular majors reported by students during Fall 2022 include those shown in the visual on the right: pre-health occupations, computer science, business administration, psychology, and more.



The majority of students (59.91%) report working anywhere from one to 40 hours per week while enrolled at the college.



GENERAL NOTES

- Categories shown for ethnicity and gender are those used and routinely reported by the CCCCO.
- Ethnicity, gender, first time student status, and first generation status are self-reported by students via questions included in CCCApply.
- Students receiving the California Promise Grant (formerly Board of Governor's Waiver) are considered low income.
- Headcount is the number of students. For example, each student contributes to one headcount at the college.
- Course enrollments are the number of courses enrolled in by students where a grade notation is awarded (i.e., A, B, C, D, F, incomplete, military withdrawal, pass, credit, no pass, no credit, report delayed, and withdrawal). For example, a student enrolled in four courses contributes four course enrollments at the college.
- Course success rate is calculated by dividing the sum of A, B, C, and pass grade notations by the total number of grade notations awarded (A, B, C, D, F, pass, no pass, incomplete, and withdrawal) and multiplying the result by 100.
